

## Student Achievement

Florida Memorial University expects all its graduates to function in a highly competitive, technological and global society. To this end, it evaluates student performance through measuring

- Freshman retention
- Course completion
- Student performance on state licensure examinations
- Student progression through a prescribed program in a defined timeline.

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<sup>iv</sup> Graduation Rate is defined as the percentage of students “entering the institution as full-time, first-time, degree/certificate-seeking undergraduate students in a particular year (cohort)... completing their program within 150 percent of normal time to completion.” In the case of regular four-year baccalaureate programs, this translates to six years.
